The technology we use every day allows us to:

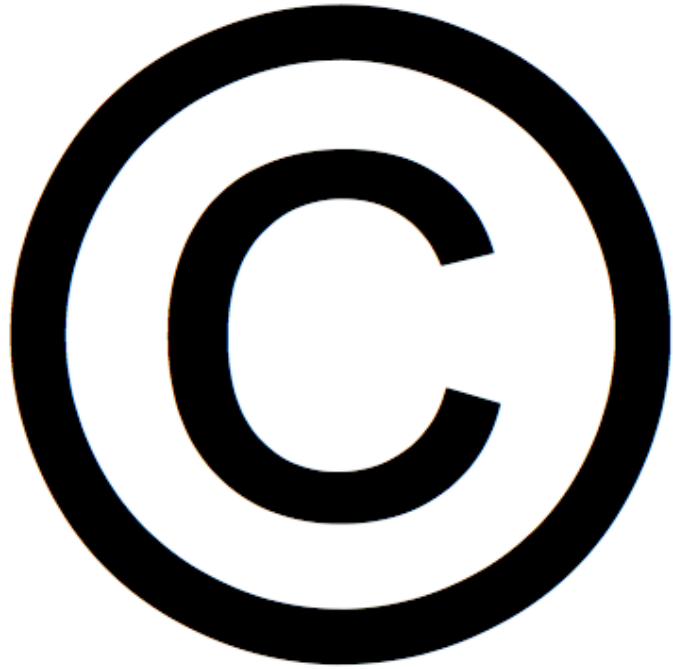
- share our own educational materials freely and extend our reach for teaching and educating others

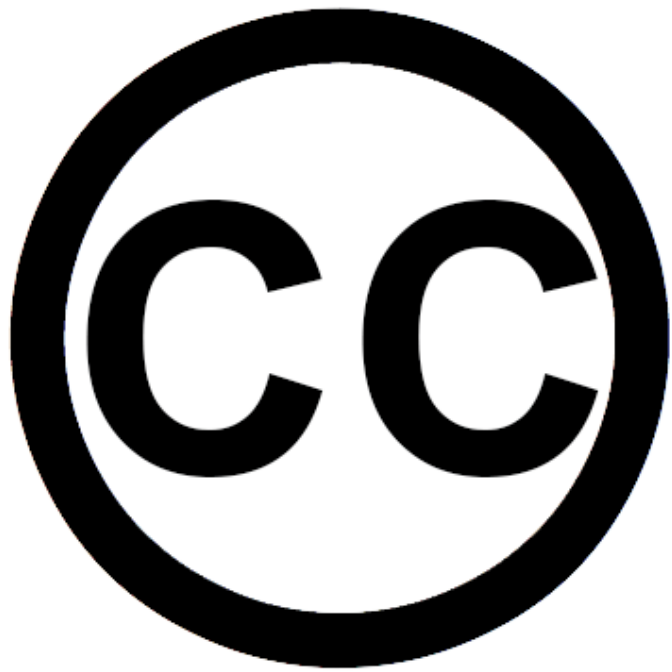

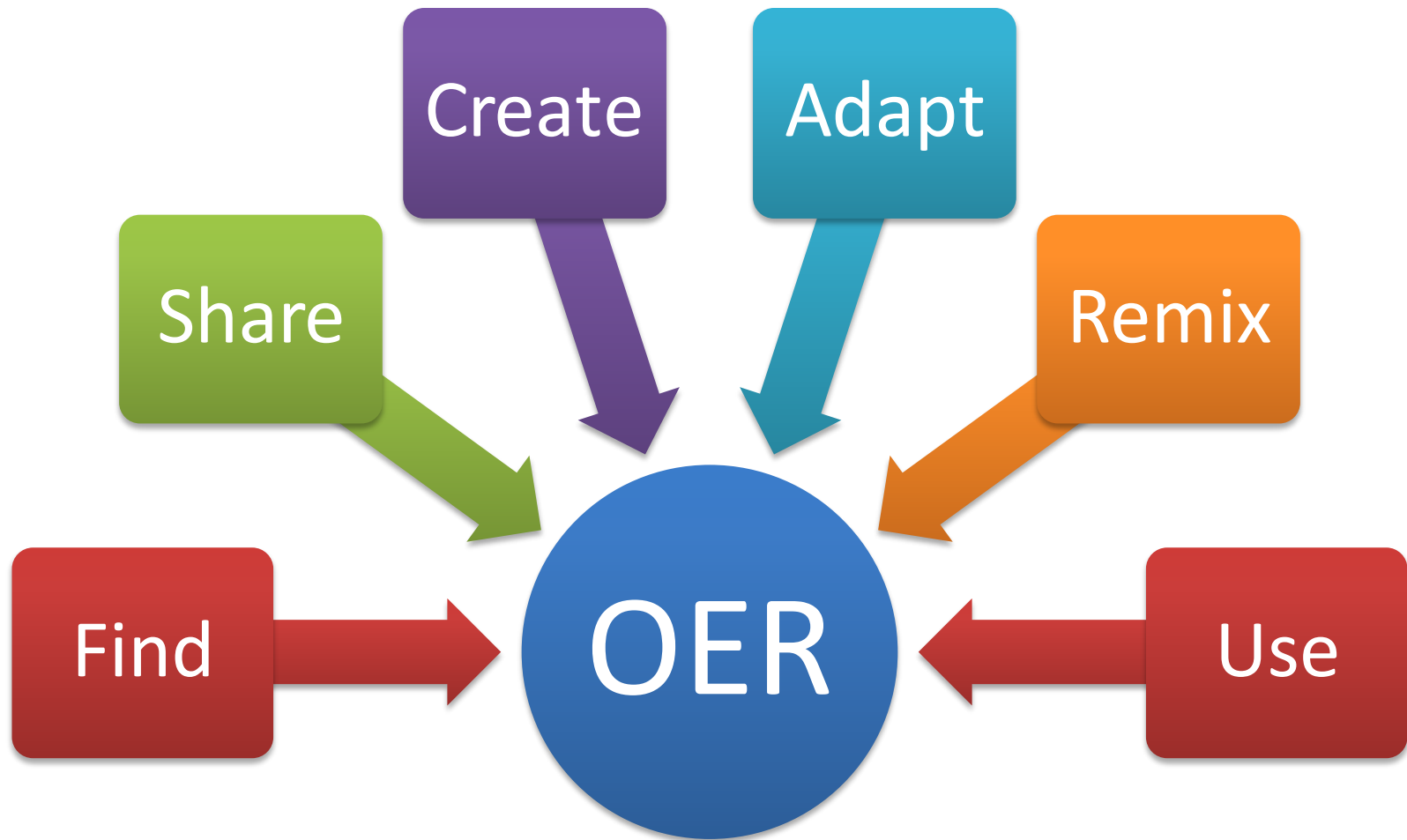
